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

SOCIAL MEDIA REPORT

The Secretariat's social media outlets have had a heavy focus on COVID-19 over the last year. Articles were posted on topics such as the use of masks, travel guidelines, impact of the pandemic on health care workers and health education, and the COVID crisis in India and Nepal. The Secretariat posted weekly nursing and midwifery highlights in the field from other WHO Collaborating Centers and regarding important topics such as the importance of flu vaccines, addressing racism and gender inequality in the health workforce, and health inequity. The beginning of 2021 marked the transition from a COVID-19 focus on media to what we learned from the pandemic and how we can address these issues better in the future.

We held several events over social media this past year, specifically through the avenue of Facebook Live. These events included our panel on COVID-19 and the Future of Higher Education in December (121 participants), The Impact of COVID-19 on Nursing in February (444 participants), and COVID Vaccine Equity in April (46 participants). Other social media posts included Zoom recordings of events like our panel on Championing Advocacy in Global Health in October and the WHO Strategic Directions for Strengthening Nursing and Midwifery in January. The World Health Assembly and International Nurses' Day were also highlighted.

We conducted a new media campaign in February, in honor of Black History Month, that highlighted black leaders that have made significant contributions to nursing and midwifery. Examples of some of the leaders showcased were Representative Lauren Underwood, Dr. Kizzy Corbett of the Vaccines & Immunopathogenesis Team at NIH, Dr. Ernest Grant of the American Nurses Association, and others. This campaign was a huge success on both Facebook and Twitter and produced some of the largest engagement numbers that we have reported this year.

As of July 2021, we report 1527 followers on Twitter and 503 likes on Facebook.





COVID UPDATE



Over the past year, the world has suffered from the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. Collaborating centers have continued to collaborate and engage throughout this time through the use of technology and innovation, altogether hosting 45 activities and 25 events, and delivering 18 publications related to COVID-19.



PROGRESS TOWARDS SOWN REPORT ACTION ITEMS

In conjunction with World Health Day on April 7, 2020, the World Health Organization (WHO) launched the <u>State of the World's Nursing (SOWN) 2020 Report</u>. The SOWN report outlines ten key actions to support the role of nursing in achieving universal health coverage, as well as the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). The SOWN report key actions listed below align with SDG 3 (good health and wellbeing), SDG 4 (quality education), SDG 5 (gender equality), and SDG 8 (decent work and economic growth). Collaborating centers have been busy working towards these action items. Figure 1 below provides self-reported data from collaborating centers on projects (activities, publications, and events) that contribute to these action items facilitated by our Global Network.




SOWN Report Ten Key Actions:

- Countries affected by shortages will need to increase funding to educate and employ at least 5.9 million additional nurses.
- 2. Countries should strengthen capacity for health workforce data collection, analysis, and use.
- 3. Nurse mobility and migration must be effectively monitored and responsibly and ethically managed.
- 4. Nurse education and training programs must graduate nurses who drive progress in primary health care and universal health coverage.

- 5. Nursing leadership and governance is critical to nursing workforce strengthening.
- 6.Planners and regulators should optimize the contributions of nursing practice.
- 7.Policymakers, employers, and regulators should coordinate actions in support of decent work.
- 8.Countries should deliberately plan for gender-sensitive nursing workforce policies.
- 9. Professional nursing regulation must be modernized.
- 10.Collaboration is key.

SOWMY REPORT





The <u>State of the World's Midwifery (SOWMy)</u> <u>2021</u> report was published in May 2021. Key recommendations of this report, authored by UNFPA, ICM, and WHO, include strengthening midwifery leadership, improving the quality of midwifery education, training and service delivery, and reinforcing health workforce data.









The Secretariat is interested in what collaborating centers are doing to support these recommendations. Since the <u>SOWMy</u> report had not yet been released at the time of this year's survey administration, data related to SOWMy projects will be collected and published as part of the 2022 Annual Report.

- Production of a compendium of Brazilian exemplary "case studies" to illustrate best practices in nursing to advance universal access to health and universal health coverage
- Increased capacity building in research through human resources development and education for health professionals in Guyana
- Long-term care (LTC) in crisis. A consortium of researchers from McMaster, University of Toronto, McGill and an international team of collaborators are examining the LTC system and its response to COVID-19

- An online version of the course "Role of Advanced Nurse Practitioner" was offered between January 6th and May 26th, 2020. The course was developed with the support of Boston College and the participation of two faculty members from Chile. Sixteen nurses successfully completed the course, and they will all be part of the nurse practitioner program at Pontificia Universidad Católica de Chile
- To support PAHO/WHO in developing capacity for nursing and health research in the Caribbean, a research training and mentorship program designed to engage and empower faculty members to increase research output was implemented. Research hubs were established following a process of assessment and mapping of research interests, skills of faculty members and resources available. Senior members of staff with research experience are serving as mentors and coaches for research hubs
- Support of PAHO/WHO in building capacity for Interprofessional Education among educators in CARICOM Countries, a survey was conducted among nurse educators from CARICOM Countries to determine training needs of nursing faculty regarding interprofessional education.
